77TH MEETING OF THE MEMBERS IS APRIL 20

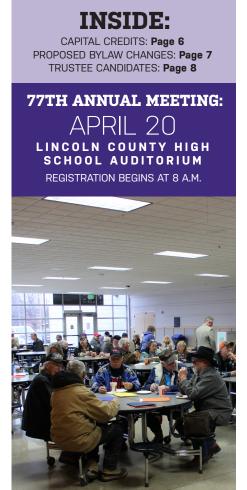

## LEC RETIRING OVER \$400,000 IN CAPITAL CREDITS

INCOLN Electric Cooperative (LEC) is a cooperative, which is a non-profit organization. Instead of profits, we have margins. Margins are any revenue we have in excess of our expenses each year.

The total yearly margins are allocated to members who were billed during the year.

Allocations are based on the dollar amount each member contributed during the year by paying their electric

bill. For example, if you contributed one percent of our total yearly revenue, you would be allocated one percent of the total margins for that year.

For the 44th consecutive year, your Board of Trustees approved the retirement of capital credits. It authorized approximately 3 percent, or around \$407,000, of our total member equity to be retired in 2023. Capital credits will be retired as a 50/50 split between the oldest and newest contributions.

If you were an active LEC member in 2005, 2006, and/or 2022, you may have a check mailed in April. Checks are only written for capital credits of \$10 or more. If yours is less than that amount, it will be refunded to you once your retired capital credit balance exceeds \$10.

Since our incorporation in 1948, LEC has returned more than \$14 million to members in capital credits.

# PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGES

THE Board of Trustees has approved presenting proposed bylaws changes to the membership for voting via mail-in ballot in conjunction with the 2024 Annual Meeting:

**Proposal #1** includes several different sections of the bylaws. The intent is to eliminate the need to have a mail-in

ballot election for uncontested trustee seats. In the event the number of qualified nominees received is equal to the number of expiring seats, no election would be required. This change requires several bylaws areas to be amended together to accomplish that objective.

Proposal #2 is to rectify a reference made incorrect during the bylaws changes approved by the membership in 2020. A section was added, which caused the ensuing sections to be renumbered. A reference to one of those renumbered sections was overlooked, and is now referencing the incorrect section number.

## PROPOSAL 1

## ARTICLE III. MEETINGS OF MEMBERS SECTION 5. VOTING

Each member shall be entitled to only one vote per membership. All questions, except the election of trustees, shall be decided by a vote of the majority of the members voting, except as otherwise provided by law, the Articles of Incorporation or these By-Laws. Trustees shall be elected by receiving the highest number of votes; not necessarily a majority. If more than one trustee is to be elected in a district, all candidates who receive the highest number of votes on a single ballot for that district shall be elected to fill the positions. Tie votes shall be resolved by a coin flip.

Proposed Addition: If the number of qualified nominations received for a district are equal to the number of expiring and/or vacant trustee seats in the same district, no election need be held for that district. and the nominee(s) shall be trustee(s) for the district as if duly elected by the membership. If the number of qualified nominations for a district is less than the number of expiring and/or vacant trustee seat(s) in the same district, the Board of Trustees shall select nominee(s) to fill the vacant nomination seat(s), no election need be held for that district, and the nominee(s) shall be trustee(s) for the district as if duly elected by the membership.

A person who intends to vote a membership of an organization with multiple ownership, shall be required to furnish, at the time of registering for the meeting and submitting their mail-in ballot, a certificate from a duly authorized officer of the organization certifying that such person shall have the right to vote the membership at the meeting and by mail-in ballot. All votes must be by ballot. No voting by proxy shall be permitted.

#### **SECTION 6. MAIL-IN BALLOTS**

Original: Members shall vote by mail-in ballot on all By-Laws amendments, By-Laws repeal, and trustee elections with the results announced at the annual meeting or last business day in April, whichever first occurs. All other voting arising from a meeting of the members shall be in person by written ballot.

Proposed Change: Members shall vote by mail-in ballot on all By-Laws amendments and By-Laws repeal. Except as provided in Section 5 of this article, members shall also vote by mail-in ballot on trustee elections. Results will be announced at the annual meeting or the last business day of April, whichever first occurs. All other voting arising from a meeting of the members shall be in person by written ballot.

## ARTICLE IV. TRUSTEES SECTION 5. TRUSTEE NOMINATIONS

There shall be nominated from each district at least as many candidates as there are trustees to be elected from such district and there be elected from each district the number of trustees specified as hereinbefore provided.

**Proposed Addition:** If the number of qualified nominations for a district is less than the number of expiring and/or vacant trustee seat(s) in the same district, the Board of Trustees shall select nominee(s) to fill the vacant nomination seat(s) as provided in Article III, Section 5.

Each nomination of the office of trustee in any district shall be made by a petition for election of trustees submitted to the Secretary of the Cooperative not less than 100 days prior to the annual meeting or at

another time as determined by the Board of Trustees at their discretion. Each petition shall consist of the printed name, address, telephone number, Cooperative member number, and original dated signature of not less than five (5) members from the candidate's district. The petition shall be signed by the candidate asserting his or her qualifications for the position and agreement to serve as trustee is so elected.

## PROPOSAL 2

## ARTICLE III. MEETINGS OF MEMBERS SECTION 3. NOTICE OF MEMBERS' MEETINGS

Original: Written notice, stating the place, day and hour of the meeting, and, in case of a special meeting or an annual meeting in which business other than listed in Article III, Section 6 of these By-Laws is to be transacted, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called, shall be delivered to each member not less than twenty-five (25) days before the date of the meeting, by or at the direction of the Secretary, or upon a default in duty by the Secretary, by the persons calling the meeting.

**Proposed Change:** Written notice, stating the place, day and hour of the meeting, and, in case of a special meeting or an annual meeting in which business other than listed in Article III, Section 7 of these By-Laws is to be transacted, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called, shall be delivered to each member not less than twenty-five (25) days before the date of the meeting, by or at the direction of the Secretary, or upon a default in duty by the Secretary, by the persons calling the meeting.

## ANNUAL MEETING

## VOTE BY MAIL FOR TRUSTEE NOMINEES

TRUSTEE elections will be conducted via mail-in ballot. This year, there are three trustee seats up for election that must be filled by a vote of the membership. All three seats represent District 6 - Upper.

Per the bylaws, all members vote for trustees in all districts, regardless of which district you reside in. Even if you are in District 7, you still vote for the trustee seats in District 6. There are four nominees? running for the three trustee seats in District 6. The three nominees with the highest number of votes will be elected.

At least two percent of our membership, about 105 members, must submit valid ballots to elect trustees.

Members who submit a mail-in ballot will be entered into a

drawing for bill certificates! We'll randomly draw a winner each for a \$250, \$150 and \$100 credit to be applied toward your electric bill.

The mail-in ballot is contained in your notice of meeting, which was mailed mid-March. To vote, either drop your completed ballot in the mail or deposit it in the ballot box in Lincoln Electric's foyer. Ballots are due to Lincoln Electric by April 15.

Per the trustee election process, all nominees could submit a bio of under 200 words with their nomination petition. Please find those bios below.
